REFLECTION

John Wycliffe (1330-1384), was a man devoted to making God's Word accessible to all. At a time when the Bible was locked away in Latin, Wycliffe believed that Scripture should be in the hands of everyday people—not just the clergy. His relentless passion led to the first English translation of the Bible, paving the way for future reformers like Martin Luther and William Tyndale.

Wycliffe's commitment to God's truth over human traditions cost him dearly. Though he died peacefully in 1384, his teachings were condemned, and years later,

his bones were dug up and burned as a symbol of rejection. Yet, his influence could not be erased. His work laid the foundation for the Bible we now freely read and cherish today. His life reminds us that God's Word is worth fighting for.

Here is what we believe about Scripture, We believe God has spoken through human authors in the Scriptures, the sixty-six canonical books of the Old and New Testaments. The Bible is the only written, verbally inspired Word of God and is self-attesting, unchanging, and without error in all it affirms. As God's authoritative, infallible, and sufficient revelation for life, doctrine, and practice, the Bible is to be trusted and obeyed. (Every Nation statement of faith)

- 1. The Bible is God's inspired word.
- 2 Timothy 3:16-17, English Standard Version
- 16 All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, 17 that the man of God[a] may be complete, equipped for every good work.
- The early Church recognised the Holy Spirit inspired these texts. The writings were not just human witness and wisdom but they are documents produced by the Holy Spirit through the participation of human authors. God continues to reveal himself through the Biblical texts, which have enduring spiritual power.
- 2. The Bible is authoritative.
- Hebrews 4:12-13, English Standard Version
- 12 For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. 13 And no creature is hidden from his sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give account.
- The writer of Hebrews was concerned that some of his fellow Jewish Christians were in danger of abandoning their faith and commitment to Jesus Christ. Because the Holy Spirit spoke through the human authors of scripture, the Bible speaks with God's authority. God's authoritative word given to us as scripture is good for our souls. If defines what is good and pleasing to God and what is evil and harmful to us.

- 3. The Bible is trustworthy and without error in all that is affirms.
- 2 Timothy 2:15, English Standard Version
- 15 Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved,[a] a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth.
- Paul was willing to endure great suffering and even martyrdom for those who were being saved in Jesus Christ. He wrote from prison urging Timothy to serve others by teaching them the truth of God's word. Because the Bible is divinely inspired, it is trustworthy in all that it affirms. No one should shy away from reading and studying scripture to avoid misinterpreting it because it's central message and many of its great truths are understandable, even to young children.
- 4. The Bible is sufficient for all we need.
- Romans 15:4, English Standard Version
- 4 For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope.
- Paul wrote to the Roman Christians to help the Jewish and Gentile believers grow together in their salvation in in Jesus Christ. Though their backgrounds and cultures were very different, Paul pointed them to the scriptures to learn how to live and fulfill God's calling together. He believed that the scriptures were sufficient to guide all of God's people to live their lives worthy of the Lord Jesus and glorify God. The Bible is adequately clear and sufficient to provide us with the knowledge necessary to have a relationship with God through Jesus Christ and to live a life pleasing to Him. It is clear, understandable, and self-authenticating (it interprets itself commonly expressed in the statement "Scripture interprets Scripture").
- 5. The Bible is to be obeyed.
- John 14:21, English Standard Version
- 21 Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me. And he who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and manifest myself to him.
- Jesus spoke with his closest disciples the evening that he was betrayed, arrested and executed. He spoke to them about the future with a deep love for them, reassuring them he would go before them to the Father in heaven. Yet, he would not leave them as orphans but would come to them again, sending the Holy Spirit to be with them to enable them to obey his commands. Obedience to the clear teaching of scripture is obedience to God. Jesus said if you obey my commands, we will abide in his love and be his friends. Those who keep even the least of God's commands and teach others to do the same will be called the greatest in God's Kingdom.
